Conversely, when discussions are approached with an assumption of goodwill, participants are more willing to listen, learn and engage constructively. Schools can help instill this mindset by modeling respectful interactions and reinforcing that disagreement does not equate to hostility.

Practical Steps for School Leaders

To cultivate a generation that values productive discourse, school leaders can:

1. **Integrate Civics Education:** Embed lessons in critical thinking, media literacy and respectful dialogue across the curriculum.
2. **Create Safe Spaces for Dialogue:** Establish programs or clubs where students can openly discuss current events and social issues in a structured, respectful manner.
3. **Highlight Commonalities:** Encourage students to explore shared values and beliefs as a starting point for deeper conversations.
4. **Model Empathy and Curiosity:** Lead by example in promoting an open-minded and empathetic school environment.
